These interventions are not just about meeting targets; they are about shaping futures futures where our children can thrive free from the threats of HIV and other challenges.

The progress we've made is not just measured in numbers, but in the lives we touch and the hope we inspire. This impact has been strengthened by our engagement with private sector stakeholders, whose increased contributions are helping us ensure a more sustainable and lasting difference for the communities we serve.



Project's Reach and Impact

USAID KHSZ Project FY24 Q3 Achievements



Empowering Caregivers: A Vital Role in HIV Viral Suppression and Nutritional Wellness

The role of caregivers in ensuring HIV viral suppression and preventing malnutrition among Children and Adolescents Living with HIV (C/ALHIV) is key. However, many caregivers face significant challenges, from conflicting schedules between economic activities and medical care to food insecurity and stigma from family and community members.

Philipo, a 3-year-old boy from Ihombo village, Kilolo district council, Iringa region, was Born to parents living with HIV, Philipo was identified as HIV positive in October 2021 and started antiretroviral treatment (ART) the same day. His journey with ART has been troubled with challenges, including missed refill dates and poor nutrition status.

The USAID KHSZ Project received Philipo while he had moderate acute malnutrition and a high viral load. The Community Case Worker (CCW) assigned to support him identified various challenges contributing to his inability to achieve viral suppression and his malnutrition, including household food insecurity, his parent's alcoholism, and his mother's mental disability.

To address these challenges, the Project

organized a clinical home visit, involving healthcare professionals and the CCW. During the visit, it was determined that Philipo's household could not provide adequate care, leading to the decision to shift him to his grandparents' care. Despite initial resistance from Philipo's mother, the intervention from a social welfare officer ensured Philipo's wellbeing and safety with his grandparents.

Following the transition, the CCW continued to provide daily and weekly support to Philipo's grandparents, ensuring adherence to medication and facilitating Enhanced Adherence Counseling (EAC) sessions.

After five months of the project's support, Philipo managed to completed EAC, his viral load significantly decreased to Target not Detecred (TND) and his body weight was iincreased significantly to a healthy amount.

Leveraging Resources for OVC/CLHIV Households

Central to our mission is the commitment to enhance the socio-economic capacities of households caring for Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC). Through our Economic Strengthening initiatives, we empower OVC caregivers to become selfsufficient, enabling them to meet the essential needs of their children without relying solely on external assistance. By increasing household incomes, families can afford the costs associated with accessing HIV care and treatment services. This, in turn, contributes to higher retention in care, achieving viral suppression, and ultimately, controlling the HIV epidemic.

By the end of the last quarter, the project reached 44,568 OVC household members with these services, including youth and caregivers. Through these community microfinance groups (CMGs) and Kaya learning groups, the project has provided platforms for members to access resources and training, fostering economic stability and resilience. These groups have become vital in helping OVC households meet costs related to HIV care and treatment, contributing significantly to the control of the HIV epidemic.

Building Sustainable Incomes and Livelihoods

The CMGs have been instrumental in driving economic growth within communities. By the

end of the last quarter, the project supported over 1,500 CMGs. Through these groups, over 5,000 loans were issued, and more than 600 new Income Generating Activities (IGAs) were established, Additionally, more than 500 OVC received support through the OVC fund, and 1,000 CMG members were able to pay their annual health insurance premiums using medical funds from the CMGs. These initiatives provide financial support and empower members to invest in their future, create sustainable livelihoods, and ensure health and educational needs are met.

Strengthening Partnerships and Skills Development

To complement the project's economic strengthening services, the USAID KHSZ Project has facilitated the linkage of youth and OVC caregivers to other USAID implementing partners, such as the USAID Imarisha Sekta Binafsi and Kilimo Tija projects, which support youth in horticultural value chains. The project continues to work closely with the International Labour Organization (ILO) to deliver entrepreneurship training through programs like Start and Improve Your Business (SIYB) and Gender and Entrepreneurship Together (GET Ahead). Last guarter, 23 project staff and 2 LGA officials began the GET Ahead certification process to enhance our capacity to deliver these trainings. Through these efforts, the project will reach 1,250 youth and

OVC caregivers across all councils by the end of Q4, equipping them with the skills needed to build sustainable futures.

Together, through sustainable economic empowerment initiatives, we are transforming the lives of OVC households while fostering resilience and hope for brighter futures in communities across Tanzania.

Zinduka Youth Group -Empowering Young People through Savings and Entrepreneurship

In Kiwangwa Ward, Chalinze DC, many young people, including those living with HIV (CLHIV), face significant challenges, including economic instability and self-stigma. These issues hinder their ability to maintain consistent HIV treatment and achieve better health outcomes.

In 2022, the USAID Kizazi Hodari Southern Zone project, through a Kaya Facilitator, mobilized the community to form the Zinduka Youth Group. Initially named Vinaja na Maendeleo CMG, the group began with 10 members (4 CLHIV and 6 non-CLHIV). The initiative was led by three CLHIV members who mobilized other youths to join and form a savings group.

Adopting the CMG model, which includes Mandatory Savings, Voluntary Savings, Development Funds, and Social Funds, the group focused on economic strengthening interventions. They participated in entrepreneurship training provided by Kaya facilitators and ESLO, which led to the development of a pineapple farming business idea. The group initially raised TZS 530,000 for

land leasing, transport, seedlings, and weed management. They further secured additional funding through the zonal team and PASADA, allowing them to rent half an acre for five years.

The Zinduka Youth Group has significantly improved the economic stability and living standards of its members. It now has 10 active members who engage in savings and incomegenerating activities. Through their collective efforts, they have established a sustainable pineapple farming business. This venture not only provides a stable income but also enhances the members' ability to adhere to HIV treatment regimens.

Mwanahamis Ally, a VETA graduate, utilized a TZS 100,000 loan to start a tailoring business, which supports her and her mother, who is living with HIV. This economic empowerment has helped improve medication adherence and overall well-being.

By addressing economic barriers and promoting social support, the Zinduka Youth Group enables members to adhere to treatment regimes, ultimately contributing to better health outcomes and viral suppression. This initiative demonstrates the role of economic empowerment in the broader HIV response strategy, ensuring sustainable health and well-being for vulnerable communities.

From Despair to Hope: Maria's Journey

"I had completely given up on myself before Kizazi Hodari Southern Zone's intervention. Despite my current challenges, there's a glimpse of hope for my well-being and that of my unborn child. Now, I am confident that I will be able to raise my child and accomplish the big dreams I have for myself, my family, and my community."

These inspiring words are from Maria, a 17-year-old school Adolescent Living with HIV (ALHIV) and a school dropout from Kichangani Ward, Morogoro MC.

Following early pregnancy, Maria dropped out of secondary school and was exiled from her home. With help from the UKHSZ Project, Maria received counselling, supported to get an alternative shelter with a relative, linked to Antenatal Clinic and was supported to access vocational training scholarship. She attends a hairdressing course at Faith Victory Vocational Training Center and has been supported with a part-time job placement in a local salon.

She attends two-hour hairdressing sessions every morning before going to the local salon

where she works as a part-time hairdresser. With a small income of 3,000, Maria saves some money to support her maternity journey.

Maria aspires to become a prominent hairdresser in her community and open her salon to support her unborn child to university. The UKHSZ Project continues to provide ART adherence counseling to Maria and is closely monitoring her pregnancy to ensure the baby is born free from HIV. Maria is one of the 248 youth supported with Vocational Skills training under the UKHSZ Project.

DREAMS Intervention

The USAID KHSZ project continues to implement both Core and Enabling DREAMS interventions. Core DREAMS focuses on providing primary and secondary services to in-school adolescent girls aged 10-14 in Iringa MC, Mufindi DC, and Tunduma TC. Enabling DREAMS targets youth (AGYW & ABYM) aged 10-17 in 12 councils of Morogoro, Iringa, Songwe, and Katavi regions, with current implementation in Iringa and Morogoro.

Advocating for norms change through the SASA! Approach

The Project implements SASA! model which is an evidence-based community mobilization approach to reinforce and spread positive messages on the prevention of sexual violence and risky behaviors among AGYWs in Iringa MC, Mufindi DC and Tunduma TC. This will be through utilizing community gatherings to address harmful norms change to prevent Sexual violence and HIV infection among adolescents, this also involves capacity building to community influencers and champions, equipping them to deliver gender norms sessions in the community.

UKHSZ DREAMS Strategic Direction in Contribution of 95-95-95.

Moving forward, the project, through the DREAMS intervention, continues to focus on the provision of HIV and sexual violence prevention activities targeting adolescent girls and boys aged 10-17 years. In contribution to achieving the UNAIDS 95-95-95 Goals, the project currently uses strategic activities such as Parents/Caregivers and community engagement, Establishment of Sexual Reproductive Health (SRH) school clubs and collaborating with facility and community IPs to provide HIV testing services among youth.

The project will also continue to target caregivers and parents in the community through the SASA! Approach and community gatherings to ensure that parents are involved in protecting adolescents against the risk of HIV infection.





Achieving Zero Dropouts: The Impact of DREAMS and CBIM in Lugodalutali Primary School

In the heart of Mufindi District Council, Iringa region, Lugodalutali Primary School is home to 276 students, comprising 126 girls and 150 boys. However, not too long ago, this school faced challenges all too common in the region: teenage pregnancies, school dropouts, and poor attendance.

Since 2020, the school has benefited from PEPFAR/USAID-funded projects, notably the DREAMS and CBIM interventions. DREAMS sessions, designed for in-school girls aged 10-14, impart crucial lessons on sexual reproductive health, HIV prevention, gender-based violence, and financial literacy. CBIM interventions target boys of the same age, instilling values of selfrespect, respect for others, and the prevention of gender-based violence through sports-based activities.

These interventions have significantly improved the school's overall performance and student behavior. Academic achievements have escalated, with zero failures in standard four for four consecutive years and standard seven performance rising from 93% in 2020 to 100% in 2023. This remarkable success is a testament to the dedication of the teachers and the supportive learning environment fostered by the school's administration. Among many inspiring stories is that of Grace, who benefited from the DREAMS program's provision of reusable sanitary pads. Grace is extremely thankful for the DREAMS program. She recounted how, when she was in the fourth grade and was about to take her national exams, the KHSZ program provided her with reusable sanitary pads. These pads proved to be a lifesaver for her during her menstrual cycle, which unfortunately came during the exams. Grace firmly believes that if she had not received these pads, she would have possibly missed her exams. The program has had a significant impact on her life, and she is grateful for the support she received when she needed it the most.

The school's commitment to discipline and education has led to zero dropouts and zero pregnancy cases, reflecting the students' respect for school values. Student attendance improved from 95% in 2020 to 100% in 2023, demonstrating their eagerness to learn.

The headteacher attests to the profound impact of DREAMS and CBIM on the community, with parents witnessing positive changes in their children's discipline and passion for learning. These evidence-based interventions play a crucial role in strengthening HIV awareness, promoting adherence to antiretroviral treatment, and fostering viral load suppression among affected populations.

Lugodalutali Primary School has become a model institution in the region, with parents and teachers recognizing the remarkable changes over the years. Students are now more respectful to one another, their teachers, and their parents, creating a more conducive learning environment. The school is grateful for the support received from these projects and is proud to be part of such impactful interventions that have helped shape the lives of young students.

The "Coaching Boys Into Men" (CBIM) program is making an impact that matters by transforming young boys' lives in three councils. With more than 5,700 adolescent boys participating across 67 schools, this initiative prevents violence and the risk of HIV. Thanks to 59 dedicated coaches, CBIM has exceeded its enrollment goals and nearly all participants have completed the sessions. This success has led to better school attendance, improved

academic performance, and a reduction in gender-based violence (GBV) and violence against children (VAC). These outcomes show the effectiveness of early interventions in fostering positive behaviors among young boys.

USAID KHSZ Project Support for VAC Survivors

Laila, 13, is a standard six pupil at Mtibwa Primary School. On September 26th, 2023, she attended a graduation ceremony at her school, afterwards, her whereabouts were unknown. Upon discovery, Laila told her mother, Theresia, that she had been sexually abused by a man who was a small business owner in the area. Laila mentioned that the abuser would give her TZS 1,000 while threatening her not to tell anyone. At the time of reporting, she had been sexually abused for two months (since July 2023).

Theresia reported to the Turiani police post, who advised sending Laila to the hospital for a further check-up. At the hospital, the Doctor confirmed that she had been sexually abused more than once and was found to be HIV positive. With support from USAID KHSZ Project CSO, WEO, ward SWO, DSWO, and a district lawyer, the mother opened the case in September 2023. With the backing from police, the abuser was arrested and placed under custody at Mtibwa police post for 5 days, and later, he was transferred to Wami police post while continuing with case proceedings.

After three months, in December 2023, the abuser was sentenced to jail for 35yrs (30 years for rape and 5yrs for infecting the child with HIV).

Counseling and Support

The USAID KHSZ Project provided ongoing

counseling and emotional support to both Laila and her mother, Theresia, to help them cope with the trauma of the abuse and the challenges of living with HIV.

ART Services Initiation

With the assistance of the project, Laila was able to start Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) services to manage her HIV infection. The project facilitated the process by ensuring that Theresia understood the importance of ART and supported her in deciding for Laila to start treatment.

Monitoring and Adherence Support:

Continual monitoring and support from Community Health Workers (CCWs) have ensured that Laila adheres to her ART medication regimen. The CCWs regularly visit the household to check Laila's progress and provide any necessary guidance or assistance.

As a result of these efforts, there have been positive improvements in Laila's health and overall well-being. Despite initial side effects, Laila is now adjusting well to the treatment, and her adherence to ART is being closely monitored to ensure continued progress.

The support provided by the UKHSZ Project has played a vital role in helping Laila overcome the challenges she faces as a survivor of sexual abuse and a young person living with HIV. The ongoing monitoring and assistance from CCWs are essential in ensuring that Laila continues to receive the care and support needed for her health and future well-being.

CBIM Sports Materials Handover in Iringa

The USAID Kizazi Hodari Southern Zone Project conducted a handover event of Coaching Boys into Men (CBIM) sports materials at JJ Mungai Primary School in Iringa. The materials, including sports jerseys, shoes, and footballs, were distributed to adolescent boys across 5 schools in Mufindi DC, helping to promote healthy relationships and prevent violence among young athletes.

CBIM is an evidence-based violence prevention program that inspires coaches to educate young male athletes about healthy relationship skills, self-respect, and respect for others. Through this program, coaches model respectful behavior and promote healthy relationships among athletes by incorporating themes such as teamwork, integrity, fair play, and respect into their daily practices. The sports materials provided will enable coaches to use football to facilitate these important interventions. The CBIM intervention targets in-school boys aged 10-14 from primary schools in Iringa, specifically in Iringa MC and Mufindi DC. The program aims to reach over four thousand adolescent boys, focusing on 40schools in Iringa MC and 14 schools in Mufindi DC.

Celebrating World Menstrual Hygiene Day: USAID KHSZ Staff Unite to Support Menstrual Hygiene for DREAMS Adolescent Girls

In celebration of World Menstrual Hygiene Day, the USAID Kizazi Hodari Southern Zone (KHSZ) Project team came together to raise funds for the DREAMS AGYW. This heartwarming initiative provided selected schools in Iringa and Songwe with essential items such as reusable sanitary kits, toilet paper, and cleaning products to ensure a safe and hygienic menstrual environment.

This effort is part of our ongoing commitment to keeping young girls in school during their periods by providing access to dignified menstrual care. The DREAMS intervention empowers young girls through mentorship, enhancing school environments, addressing performance issues, and eliminating factors that lead to school dropout. In the last guarter, the project reached over five thousand Adolescent Girls and Young Women (AGYW) across 133 primary schools in Iringa MC, Mufindi DC, and Tunduma TC.

The USAID KHSZ team also provided education on menstrual health management (MHM), equipping these young girls with the

necessary knowledge, and understanding to manage their menstrual health effectively. This initiative not only supports their physical well-being but also empowers them to stay in school and continue their education with confidence.

Collaboration with USAID Afya Yangu Southern

The collaboration between USAID KHSZ and USAID Afya Yangu Southern (UAYS) continues to drive positive results across various areas, especially in viral load (VL) testing and viral load suppression (VLS).

This guarter, there have been significant improvements in these metrics, thanks to our joint efforts. Key activities contributing to this success include regular data review meetings, monthly data sharing, and the involvement of senior management in these discussions. Moving forward, we are committed to strengthening our collaboration by ensuring UKHS staff have better access to clinical data.

This partnership has also been strengthened through joint supportive supervision, orientation sessions for Community Case Workers (CCWs) and healthcare Workers (HCWs), and coordinated home visits across implementation regions like Morogoro, Iringa, Njombe, and Ruvuma. These combined efforts have enhanced service delivery and led to the identification of new cases. contributing to improved clinical outcomes.

DREAMS Interagency Visit

The USAID Kizazi Hodari Southern Zone Project alongside USAID Afya Yangu Southern participated in an interagency DREAMS field visit in Iringa. This event brought together various PEPFAR-supported agencies, including USAID and Peace Corps, along with implementing partners like UNICEF, EpiC (FHI360), the Government of Tanzania through the Tanzania Commission for AIDS (TACAIDS) and PO-RALG as one of our key stakeholders. The visit aimed to deepen the understanding of PEPFAR-supported DREAMS programs from both agency and interagency perspectives while also promoting data exchange and fostering innovative collaboration.

Key sites visited included Ismani Secondary School, Lyandembela Secondary School in Ifunda, Nzizi Health Facility, Iringa DC, Ipogolo Health Clinic, and Iringa Medical Center.

The Determined, Resilient, AIDS-Free, Mentored, and Safe (DREAMS) initiative is an evidence-based intervention aimed at empowering adolescent girls and young women and reducing HIV risk through youthfriendly reproductive health care. It actively mobilizes communities for change through various HIV and violence prevention initiatives, while also providing crucial support to families through social protection measures. Through these two USAID-funded projects, Deloitte implements DREAMS interventions across the Iringa, Morogoro, Songwe, and Ruvuma regions.







Engaging Stakeholders for Impact: USAID Kizazi Hodari Southern Zone Project's FY25 Plans
